Latin for schools and others

For many years the Centre for Continuing Education has been offering a Latin course as part of its language program during 1st and 2nd semester. The Centre also offers an extension course in Latin to all school and college students of any age as an adjunct to their studies in language, English, history, politics or law.

Latin for schools is a reading course, and all students begin to read the Latin of the Romans from the very first session. The reading materials are chosen to reflect the interests of students or for relevance to other courses of study. There is also a basic book of readings that introduces the students to the structures of the Latin language. The course is based on linguistic principles and enables students to gain a portmanteau skill that can be applied to other languages and other disciplines. Students gain a knowledge of the structure of the Latin language from guided reading which leads them to deduce the nature of each element of the language as it is introduced.

Accreditation

The Latin Reading Course is fully accredited by the ACT Board of Senior Secondary Studies so that students are also able to include Latin as part of the Year 12 Certificate and the TER score.

Cost and materials

All materials will be provided at each session. The fee for 1st semester 2010 is \$250 * and students may attend one or two sessions per week for the same cost.
