THE AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL UNIVERSITY

The Australian National University (ANU) was established by the federal parliament in 1946 specifically to lead the development of the intellectual capacity of the nation through research and postgraduate training in line with the best international standards. In 1960 ANU accepted responsibility for research-led undergraduate education at the same high standards.

As the specially chartered national university of the federal government, ANU is characterised by a unique concentration of effort in the fundamental disciplines, the national recruitment of students, accessible infrastructure and collaborative scholarly and business networks.

ANU advances the national intellectual and creative capacity through broad-based research and research-led education:

- in the disciplines fundamental to all knowledge – the humanities, the sciences, the social sciences
- in a spectrum of professional disciplines and the creative arts
- by studying Australia in its various contexts.

ANU recognises that its capacity to support, develop and critique Australian society will be greatest when academic freedom is exercised in a manner consistent with a responsible search for knowledge and its dissemination.

The University recognises that its greatest assets are its staff and students.

The planning framework for ANU is one in which University goals and objectives are met by creating an environment in which staff, students and visitors can achieve their personal goals.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We would like to acknowledge and thank all of our donors who gave gifts and supported our Endowment in 2005. The Endowment now has over 204 separate accounts, funding scholarships, bursaries and prizes on an annual basis. An increasing number of supporters, notably alumni, are choosing to contribute on this basis, pointing to new opportunities for friends of the University to assist in achieving its goals.

During 2005 the Board of Governors decided to recommend to the ANU Council, that it establish an ANU Foundation which would spearhead the University's efforts to fundraise both in Australia and internationally. The ANU Council agreed to this recommendation and steps were taken in 2005 to begin to identify and develop the basis for this Foundation. The new Foundation would lead, in a proactive way, fundraising support of ANU and it would comprise members drawn from a wide ranging group of ANU supporters and donors.

Highlights for 2005 included:

- market value of the Endowment grew by 21.55 per cent during 2005, an increase of \$20.24 million over 2004, bringing the total donor funds (at market value) to \$93.93 million
- new donations for the Endowment during 2005 were 5.9 million
- 95 students from the full range of faculties were supported through an endowed scholarship program
- 288 students received prizes through the endowment fund and from annually funded contributions
- 110 students received bursaries from the endowment to assist them in continuing their studies
- 22 academic appointments were supported from the endowment across a wide range of disciplines and support for the Public Lecture program continued to be a successful addition to the campus activities
- visiting fellowships were awarded in science, medical research, asian studies, economics, law, philosophy, social science, Australia Japan relationships, mathematics and indigenous studies
- several contributing members were added to the Endowment for Excellence
- 10 existing donors significantly increased their support to the Endowment and had their membership elevated to a higher level
- the bequest program continued to grow. Seven new Patrons were welcomed in this program of support for the University
- some patrons continue to make significant advance payments into an Endowment fund established in the name of the bequest. This brings forward the benefit to the University and in many cases enables the benefactor to see the fruits of their benefaction during their lifetime.
- the Friends of the School of Music established a fund which would support special projects, scholarships and prizes at the School of Music

During 2005, ANU forged a partnership with some of the world's leading research-intensive universities to enhance the potential for our staff and students to collaborate with the world's best. This initiative will no doubt impact on the work we do to assist in supporting students and staff and the ability to offer a broader spectrum of scholarship assistance.

In 2005 the ANU structure was changed to establish seven Colleges. This report reflects those changes in reporting the donor and support within the new College framework.

The Board also commenced a review of its own role and of the strategic directions of the Endowment in its role as advisor to the Vice-Chancellor. Ms Ouma Sananikone, BA(ANU), MComm (UNSW) resigned from the Board of the Endowment and we thank her most sincerely for her contribution. Mr John Wallis left the University and the position of Executive Officer of the Endowment. Mrs Joan Uhr took up a new position of Director, Foundation and Alumni Relations. Mrs Clare Astten, Mrs Denise Steele and Mrs Rhonda Robinson were appointed to administrative roles within the Foundation and Alumni Relations unit.

I am grateful for the time and energy contributed by my colleagues on the Board and we look forward to another growing year in 2006.

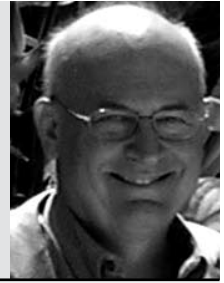

**ANTHONY F. GRANUCCI MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND
ANU COLLEGE OF ARTS & SOCIAL SCIENCES**
Anthony Francis Granucci died on 7 December 2005.



Anthony was born in San Francisco in 1944, and raised in Richmond, California. He graduated cum laude from the Harvard Law School in 1968. He then taught at Indiana University School of Law before turning to practise law in the US, and in Indonesia with the firm of Mochtar, Karuwin and Komar. He was involved in many ground-breaking infrastructure developments, including Indonesia's first privatised power plant.

While in Indonesia, he developed a lifelong interest in the arts and archaeology of the Indonesian archipelago. His final professional work was in 2000-2002 for Bechtel Corporation as a developer of railway infrastructure in Europe, including the privatisation of the London Underground in which he played a key role. When his cancer was first diagnosed in January 2003, he retired to pursue his interest in art history and archaeological interests.

Because of the pre-eminence of ANU scholarly work, Mr Granucci established an endowment fund with the ANU Endowment to support research opportunities for young Indonesian and Timorese archaeologists. The inaugural award will be made in June 2006.

**MINORU HOKARI MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP
ANU COLLEGE OF ARTS & SOCIAL SCIENCES**
Minoru Hokari died in May 2004 - he was just 32.



A pathbreaking scholar and inspiring colleague, Minoru (1971-2004) made outstanding contributions towards 'cross-culturalising' historical practice and towards developing a respectful collaborative research strategy with Indigenous Australians. A graduate of Hitotsubashi University (MEc 1996) and The Australian National University (PhD 2001), Minoru conducted fieldwork amongst Gurindji elders, who he acknowledged as exceptional historians in their own right.

His untimely death in 2004 curtailed a very promising career. His family, colleagues and friends in the ANU Australian Centre for Indigenous History in the Research School of Social Sciences decided to establish a scholarship as a memorial to him. A fund was established in the ANU Endowment for Excellence to award this scholarship in perpetuity.

The annual Minoru Hokari Memorial Scholarship is intended to assist a postgraduate student to conduct fieldwork or related research in Australian Indigenous history. The inaugural award was made to Lorina Barker, who will take up the award in 2006.

BEQUESTS

The bequest program continues to be well supported and covers a wide range of disciplines and purposes including the humanities, art and music, medical research, science, mathematics, the social sciences and the environment. Bequests provide future support for professorial chairs, scholarships and research activities. (see table of Patrons later in this Report).

We were saddened during the year by the loss of two of our very generous donors: Dr Helen Wurm and Mr Anthony F. Granucci. Both of these donors very generously had left a bequest to the University. Dr Helen Wurm's bequest will establish The Stephen and Helen Wurm Fund within the ANU College of Asia and the Pacific, to support research and study in Pacific and Papua New Guinea languages. The Anthony F. Granucci Fund will support research opportunities for young Indonesian and Timorese scholars in prehistory and protohistory.

We have also been proud to establish the Beryl John Bequest Fund and the Dennis Griffin Scholarship Fund at the School of Music. We look forward to making the inaugural award and support from these funds in 2006.

We welcomed seven new Patrons as Honorary Members of the Endowment for Excellence for their special commitment and support to the University and its activities through a bequest in their wills. Their support is a significant long-term commitment to the University and will provide support for such activities as medical research, astronomy, humanities research, economics and support for Indigenous students from regional Australia.

DENNIS GRIFFIN BEQUEST

Supporting the Dennis Griffin Scholarship in Piano
Accompaniment and Composition

ANU COLLEGE OF ARTS & SOCIAL SCIENCES

Dennis Griffin died in November 2004.



Dennis, a former pianist and teacher, studied piano advanced harmony and counterpoint at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music under Frank Hutchens and Dr Alex Barnard at the time of Sir Eugene Goosens. He served in Papua New Guinea during World War II as an infantry officer in the 7th Division.

When his career in music was cut short due to illness, he joined the Public Service. He came to Canberra in 1971 to work for the Department of Foreign Affairs and retired in 1980. He got to know John Painter, a former Director of the Canberra School of Music and this was the beginnings of his association with the music school.

He was motivated to make a bequest to support piano and composition at the School of Music because he wanted to give others the opportunity he had himself as a young man and to encourage others to pursue musical education.

His love of music made him a regular visitor to the ANU School of Music. This combined with the desire to provide others with the same opportunities he had as a student, inspired him to establish a scholarship for many future generations of music students through his bequest.

INVESTMENT PERFORMANCE REVIEW

The investment funds of the Endowment for Excellence form part of the University's Long Term Investment Pool (LTIP). The LTIP is an actively managed balanced fund with exposure to the major asset classes. The funds are managed by the ANU Investment Office, which is responsible for the preparation of the investment strategy and other asset allocation and investment policy papers for consideration by the Investment Advisory Committee (IAC). The IAC reports to Finance Committee which in turn reports to the ANU Council.

A well considered and somewhat cautious investment strategy was adopted for the LTIP throughout 2005. For the year ended December 2005 real global economic growth increased by 3.3 per cent whilst inflation rose 2.7 per cent. In terms of the individual countries/regions real economic growth in China, Japan, North East Asia and South East Asia all exceeded initial forecasts whilst the US, Europe and Australia were all below initial forecasts.

The LTIP asset allocation as at 31 December 2005 was as follows:

- domestic equities 42.3 per cent
- overseas equities 16.1 per cent
- fixed interest 11.2 per cent
- cash/short term investments 21.9 per cent
- property 5.8 per cent
- alternative investments 2.7 per cent.

The high cash weighting was in part due to the historically low exposure to the longer term fixed interest.

Mercer Investment Consulting, an independent advisory group, advised that the return on the LTIP for the year ended 31 December 2005 was 23.5 per cent (after the actual management expense ratio of 0.12 per cent). The external benchmark for the LTIP is the median return of the Mercer Pooled Funds Survey (after tax and fees), which achieved a return of 15.1 per cent for the year. The comparable return for the LTIP (after assuming a tax rate of 7.0 per cent) was 21.7 per cent. This return ranked the LTIP in first place in the Mercer survey of 40 funds. The analysis from Mercer also highlighted the strong longer term performance of the LTIP which ranked first for every rolling period in the last decade apart from the three year period when it ranked second.

In 2005 the LTIP returns for all sectors outperformed their respective benchmarks. The 38.7 per cent return on the internally managed domestic equity portfolio in 2005 was well above the 22.5 per cent return of the benchmark and the 23.5 per cent median return of the Mercer Australian Share Funds Specialists Survey (ASFS). The LTIP ranked first in this survey of 100 funds. The strong longer term performance also continues with the LTIP rated seventh out of 59 funds in the ASFS over five years and fourth out of 30 funds over 10 years. The University maintains an active equity management process based on stock selection with an emphasis on the longer term. For the 2005 year, the significantly overweight exposure to strongly performing stocks in the Materials (resources) sector such as BHP, RIO and Woodside greatly assisted performance.

In terms of overseas equities, the LTIP returned 17.8 per cent (benchmark 16.8 per cent) in 2005 with all of the LTIP overseas managers outperforming the benchmark.

The University fixed interest portfolio returned 6.0 per cent (benchmark 5.8 per cent) in 2005. The portfolio has outperformed the benchmark for eight of the last 10 years. The strong medium to long term performance is evident with the LTIP ranking eighth out of 41 funds over five years and sixth out of 20 funds over 10 years and generating a higher return than the median manager over both periods.

The direct property portfolio generated a return of 48.5 per cent compared to the index of 13.9 per cent. This strong out performance was due to the sale of a property at a price that was well above the written down price at 31 December 2004. The Listed Property sector returned 15.8 per cent (benchmark 12.7 per cent) in 2005.

The LTIP generated a 38.8 per cent return on the Alternative Investment (AI) sector of the portfolio (14 investments). The performance was driven by some revaluation events for selected unlisted investments and the strong price performance of some listed investments including Pharmaxis and Geodynamics. Mercer did not provide a benchmark for this sector.

CURRENT INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The Consensus Economics Inc forecasts for the world in 2006 shows reasonable economic growth and subdued inflation. Economic growth in the US is forecast to be slightly stronger in 2006 compared to 2005. There is continuing optimism for the recoveries in Japan (domestic consumption adding to solid export sector) and Europe (robust export sector and lagging domestic consumption). Growth in the Asia (ex Japan) economies is forecast to remain significantly above that provided by the more mature economies. Modest growth is also forecast for the Australian economy.

This global growth outlook provides a good platform for investors. Notwithstanding this there are short-term risks (eg energy prices) and medium term risks (eg savings and investment imbalances) that could become short term risks very quickly and support the retention of a degree of caution by investors. In addition valuations are not cheap in any sector and investors will need to remain selective. It is expected that listed equities will outperform long term bonds over the year. Within domestic equities the focus will remain on the materials (resources) sector where valuations and growth prospects remain more attractive than the industrials.

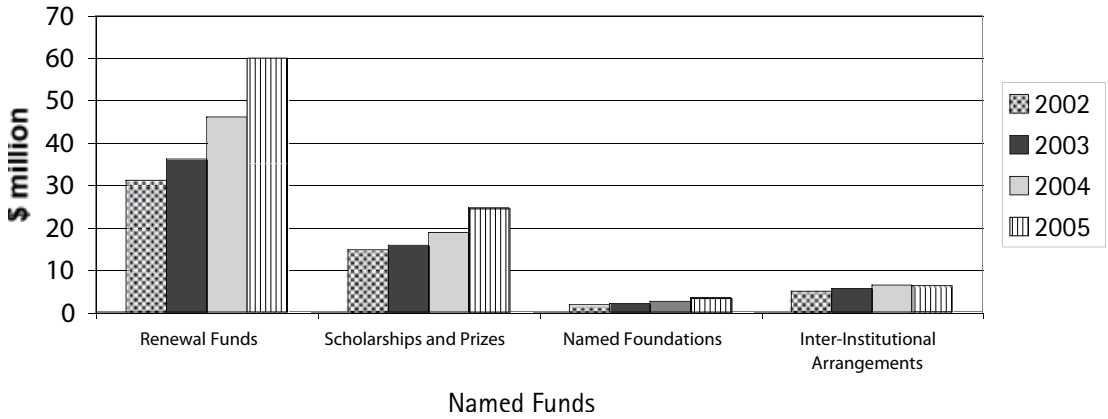
In light of the improved global valuations, particularly in the US market, and the reasonable economic outlook for the global economy the University has increased overseas equity exposure since 31 December 2005 towards the longer term strategic target of 20 per cent. Exposure to AI (now including direct and unlisted property) will also be increased towards a longer term target of 20 per cent.

FUNDS BY CATEGORY

The Endowment for Excellence has four broad categories within which funds are maintained and which receive the majority of external donations that directly benefit the University. The most significant categories and the amounts as of 31 December 2005 are listed below:

Total Endowment Funds for 2005

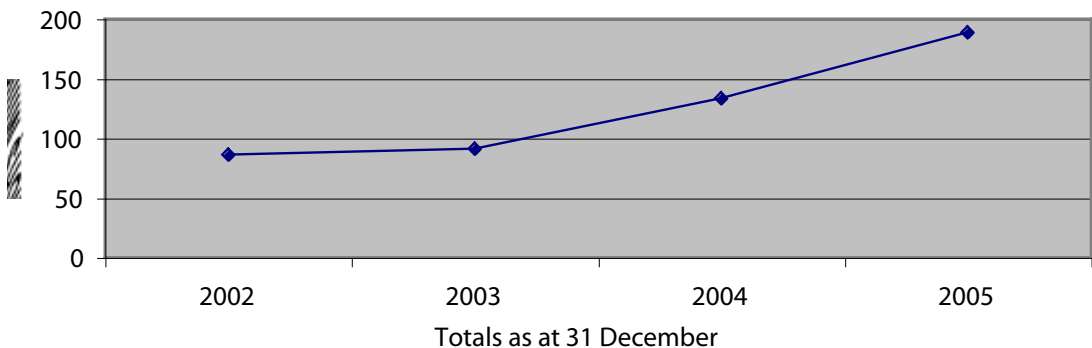

VICE-CHANCELLOR'S RENEWAL FUND:

The Vice-Chancellor's Renewal Fund, ANU Salary Indexation Reserve and ANU CSS Reserve have been established in the Endowment with University Funds. As the funds were not sourced from external donors, the Vice-Chancellor may resolve to apply the funds for other University purposes outside the Endowment.

ANU Salary Indexation Reserve

This reserve was established in 1999 to support future salary increases negotiated with staff through enterprise bargaining, and more recently has supported scholarships.

ANU CSS Reserve

In December 2005 \$35 million was transferred from the University's Commonwealth Superannuation Reserve to the University Endowment. Of this amount, \$10 million was used to extinguish internal debts, \$5 million was retained in the VC's Renewal Fund and \$20 million allocated to the ANU CSS Reserve.

Disability Support Fund

The Disability Support Fund provides appropriate support for students with disabilities that would not be possible without this resource. The fund has enhanced the access to equitable, effective and successful study for students with disabilities at ANU. A total of 127 students who had been registered with the DSU graduated in 2005: 50 graduated in July, and 77 graduated at the December ceremony. Many of these students would have benefited from the resources made available by the Disability Support Fund.

In 2005, the Disability Support Fund has provided an extremely valuable source of funding for a range of activities associated with the provision of support for students with disabilities. Although the description of the services offered may sound simple and bland they do provide an essential and vital resource for the students, who without such things many of their activities would not be possible to achieve. Activities have included:

- the provision of Note taking and mentor services for higher need students
- the purchase of multi-user site licences for assistive software to enable the integration of the full suite of assistive technology programs into the standard student image on all InfoCommons PC computers
- the purchase of assistive software to be loaned to individual students
- the purchase of equipment for shared use by students
- the purchase of a mobility scooter for loan to students
- the purchase of computers for loan to students with mobility or health impairments in order to facilitate effective access to studies and resources
- the provision of internet access for students who are unable to fully access campus services
- upgrading the DSU equipment pool for the use of, and loan to students.

Inter-Institutional Relations

In recognition of its wider national role and responsibilities, The Australian National University manages a number of funds linking ANU and Australians with other major institutions. No matching funds have been provided and the institutions are responsible for their own fundraising.

These include:

The Oxford Australia Scholarship Fund assists Australian students to study at Oxford.

- Every year, two students are awarded James Fairfax scholarships for one to three year courses. In 2005, Brenda Tronson (BCL) and Philip Manners (DPhil in Economics) were appointed.
- In collaboration with the British High Commission, two students are awarded the Chevening Oxford Australia one year scholarships in 2005. Alexander Phipps and Catherine Eakin reading for BCLs.
- The University College Old Members' Fund is supporting Kwan Hee Lee reading for a D Phil in Physics at Oxford.
- Thanks to the Sir Vincent Fairfax Family Foundation, Jonathan Lo and Jason Wong are completing their studies for D Phil in Engineering Science and D Phil in Physical Chemistry respectively in 2006. The two Vincent Fairfax Life Sciences scholars were appointed in 2003.
- The Magdalen College Oxford Australia Fund will appoint its first scholars in 2006.
- In 2005, there were nine Australian students in Oxford supported by the Oxford Australian Scholarship fund. This brings the total number of scholars supported by the generosity of the donors to the Oxford Australia Fund to 34 since the first scholars were appointed in 1998.

Cambridge Australia Trust to support Australian students at Cambridge in 2005.

- Seven CAT (Poynton) Scholarships were awarded for Australian graduates to undertake their PhDs at Cambridge.
- One Oliphant Scholarship. This is a new award made to commemorate the memory of the famous Australian physicist, Sir Mark Oliphant. Sir Mark was the Founding Director of the Research School of Physical Sciences and ANU in 1950, and subsequently was the Patron of the Cambridge Australia Trust. The Scholarship was made possible by generous donations from Emeritus Professor Peter and Dr Barbara Treacy and by a contribution from the Cambridge Commonwealth Trust.

Two Gates Scholarships were awarded to CAT applicants by the Cambridge Commonwealth Trust.

Asian Studies Association of Australia Inc Fund encourages and rewards excellence in scholarship in Asia and to advance and develop interest in the field of Asian Studies throughout Australia.

Hans Mol Endowment Fund supports and encourages research and publications in the social scientific study of religion.

Robert Gordon Menzies Scholarship Fund was awarded to Ms Katie Connolly who is studying a Master of Public Policy at the John F Kennedy School of Government at Harvard.

ACT Orthopaedic and Musculoskeletal Research Foundation. The Foundation transferred funds to establish the The Reginald Kitchin Scholarship Fund. The award is expected to be made in 2006.

The Neville Bonner Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Ms Nina Lupinacci who is studying Honours in Aboriginal Policy and Management at the University of South Australia.

Indigenous scholarship leads to further study



Indigenous student Leila Smith was working two jobs in 2005, making it difficult for her to study subjects with heavy workloads or longer contact hours at ANU.

But the second-year Arts student also had an exemplary record of achievement and community engagement. She represented the National Indigenous Youth Movement of Australia at the International Youth Leadership Event in Adelaide in early 2005. Before that, she was chosen as a Harmony Ambassador by the Migrant Resource Centre, leading young people from diverse cultural backgrounds on a 10 day tour through New South Wales.

Ms Smith was awarded the Rotary-Alf Gillespie Award in May 2005 for these and other demonstrations of leadership and engagement. She said the scholarship for Indigenous students meant she could cut back on her work hours and concentrate on her courses in Indigenous studies and sociology.

"I felt like I was being heard, that the problems faced by many Indigenous students were being acknowledged," she said. "The award helped a lot with my self-esteem, and helped me towards finishing the degree. It was very supportive."

Ms Smith said the award would allow her to stay on at ANU to complete an honours year. She will also take up a cadetship at the Department of Education, Science and Training when she completes her studies.

The Rotary Alf-Gillespie Award is a scholarship of \$2,000 for one year given to an Indigenous Australian student enrolled full-time in the second or subsequent year of a degree program in archaeology, anthropology, and courses related to Indigenous Australian culture, history or language.

PASSPORT TO SUCCESS



When Emeritus Professor Bob Crompton reflects on his motivations for establishing a perpetual scholarship for physics research students, a personal career highlight springs to mind. It was 1968, and he had some experimental results to present at a large international conference in the United States.

"A well-known theoretical physicist, Neal Lane, was there and was also presenting some results in the same area. Following our presentations, we found that my applied results and his theoretical ones agreed very well," Crompton says.

"It was a tremendous thrill that they complemented each other so perfectly."

It was a great confidence boost for an academic in the earlier years of his career, and one that has stayed with him.

"I've always felt strongly about sending students overseas. It's a valuable part of a developing academic career," he says.

The R and H Crompton Travelling Scholarship was established in 2002, with the first recipients being awarded in 2003.

The scholarship provides a grant of up to \$5,000 each year to two research students at the Research School of Physical Sciences and Engineering, with the explicit purposes of aiding their travel to conferences or laboratories overseas.

"The idea behind this particular scholarship is to get people overseas in the last years of their PhD to a relevant conference or to similar research groups in other organisations," Crompton says.

He hopes the scholarship will allow students to build contacts, collaborate on projects, and generate employment opportunities either at conferences or by visiting other laboratories and academics.

"An important aspect is also that they're ambassadors for the school," Crompton says.

"We hope that there is a type of feedback happening, where the students are reflecting both on themselves and their own career, but also back on the school and the excellent science that's happening here."

For doctoral student Steven Morrison, who received the scholarship in 2005, it will provide a chance to travel to one of the largest conferences relevant to his field, non-linear physics, next year.

Morrison's research is looking into how photonic crystals and harnessing the power of light could revolutionise communications and computer technologies. He says that travel to conferences can often broaden the scope of one's research by thorough exposure to the latest advances and techniques.

"What you're aiming for as a researcher – especially in the early stages of your research career – is to get your work reported to the scientific community. It's an integral part of what you're trying to do.

"But there are also other benefits. At these conferences you hear presentations of related work, you get to question the speakers, you talk to colleagues from around the world and you get ideas which can focus your own work in a whole new direction. It can mean you get key information about an element of your research that takes you forward," Morrison says.

For Crompton, being able to help create opportunities for the students, and in turn the school, is a very satisfying experience.

"My wife and I hope to meet the recipients after they've come back, and to hear of their experiences. It's not a compulsory requirement of receiving the scholarship, but the students seem delighted to share their experiences and we equally delighted to hear them," he says.

Appendix A

History and Overview of Endowment

Council established the Endowment for Excellence on 1 August 1996 to mark the 50th Anniversary of the University.

The Endowment provides the opportunity for alumni, staff, benefactors and the wider community to support the University's aspirations in a variety of material and on-going ways. It now includes funds whose capital is preserved with interest earnings available for worthwhile activities, and also annually supported awards.

Donations previously donated to the University over its first 50 years (some \$12.75 million) were initially consolidated to form the basis of the Endowment. Considerably more has been added during its life to date.

Funds in the Endowment include the following categories:

1. Scholarships and prizes at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels.
2. The ANU Excellence and Renewal Program which supports the highest standards of scholarship and teaching, including named professorial chairs, seminars, art and equipment acquisition, the recruitment and retention of outstanding staff and research programs.
3. Named foundations which support defined disciplines or activities.
4. Inter-institutional relationships, which provides for activities of mutual benefit with other institutions.

The Endowment also allows donors to support activities on the basis of annual or periodic donations, or to make a donation for a specific purpose to be drawn upon until the gift is exhausted.

The University also has an active bequest program, enabling friends of the University to leave an enduring legacy which supports future generations of scholars and staff.

The Endowment was established by statute of the University, The Australian National University Endowment for Excellence Statute. Under this Statute, The Australian National University Endowment for Excellence Rules provide more detailed guidance on governance and operations. The Statute and Rules of the Endowment ensure that the wishes of donors are respected. Where it is no longer possible or practical for the original intention to be fully honoured, the terms may be varied, but in so doing the University must have regard to the original intention of the donation.

The Australian National University Code of Practice for Philanthropy

(adapted from the Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee, 2000)

Australian Universities have a long and distinguished history of philanthropic support from generous benefactors. It is a tradition of giving and sharing that is vital to the role of Universities in advancing knowledge for the common good. Universities recognise that the support of well-motivated citizens and corporations will always be important. There are many people who are eager to make a lasting contribution to the role that universities play. To ensure that The Australian National University earns and maintains the respect and trust of the general public, and that Donors and prospective Donors can have full confidence in the University, The Australian National University commits itself to this Code of Practice.

Responsibilities of the University

1. The University will welcome and respect the interest of individuals and organisations seeking to contribute to the University.
2. The University will ensure that University staff engaged in Donor liaison and the soliciting of gifts do not grant or accept favours for personal gain and avoid actual or apparent conflicts of interest.
3. The University will ensure that all personnel involved in managing gifts exercise prudent judgement in their stewardship responsibilities.
4. The University will ensure that only authorised representatives of the University undertake solicitation of gifts.
5. The University will not seek or accept gifts where this would be inconsistent with the University's mission.
6. The University will at all times respect information about Donors and prospective Donors and their gifts and will ensure that such information is handled confidentially, to the extent provided by law and consistent with the Donor's wishes.
7. The University will ensure that potential Donors are encouraged to seek independent professional advice about the taxation status and any other business or legal implications of their gifts or potential gifts. University staff may work with such advisers to assist with gift arrangements.
8. The University will ensure that non-cash gifts and gifts in kind are evaluated having regard to the University's capacity to use the gift effectively, the benefits they may bring and any on-going costs associated with their use and maintenance.
9. The University will ensure that all gifts are treated in accordance with the Donor's wishes, to the extent consistent with the letter and spirit of the law.
10. The University will ensure that all gifts are dealt with in accordance with all laws and regulations applicable.
11. The University will confirm the acceptance of all gifts in writing.
12. The University reserves the right to decline a gift for any reason.
13. The University will ensure that all Donors have access to its most recent published financial statements.

14. The University will ensure that Donors receive prompt, truthful and complete answers to their inquiries.
15. The University will ensure that all Donors receive appropriate acknowledgment and recognition being mindful of the donor's wishes.

Rights of Donors

16. A Donor can expect to be informed of the University's mission, of the way the University intends to use the gift, and of its capacity to use gifts effectively for their intended purposes.
17. A Donor can expect that the University and its staff will actively and positively provide relevant information on the University, and the use of, and progress with, the gift.
18. A Donor can expect to be informed of the identity of the University's key personnel involved in managing the gift.
19. A Donor can expect that the behaviour of individuals representing the University will be professional in nature.
20. A Donor can expect to be informed whether those seeking gifts from them are volunteers, University staff, or engaged agents.
21. A Donor can expect that their details will be treated confidentially and will not be shared with any organisation outside the University without their explicit permission.

(Adopted by University Council, 5 April 2002)
