

EXPERIENCE

These experiences will also provide you with examples for your job applications and demonstrate your motivation and proactive approach.

Seek internships, vacation programs, voluntary and casual employment relevant to your field if possible. Get involved in student clubs and societies. Make the most of group projects, community work, exchange programs and mentoring. Maintain records of all your experiences and skills you developed and refined.



QUALIFICATIONS

While it is true that many industries look for specific degrees, such as engineering, cyber security, health or law, there are a lot of employers that consider students from **any discipline**. In other words, there may be opportunities for you with employers that you might not initially think of. To find out about such opportunities you need to proactively seek contact with recruiters and industry professionals.
